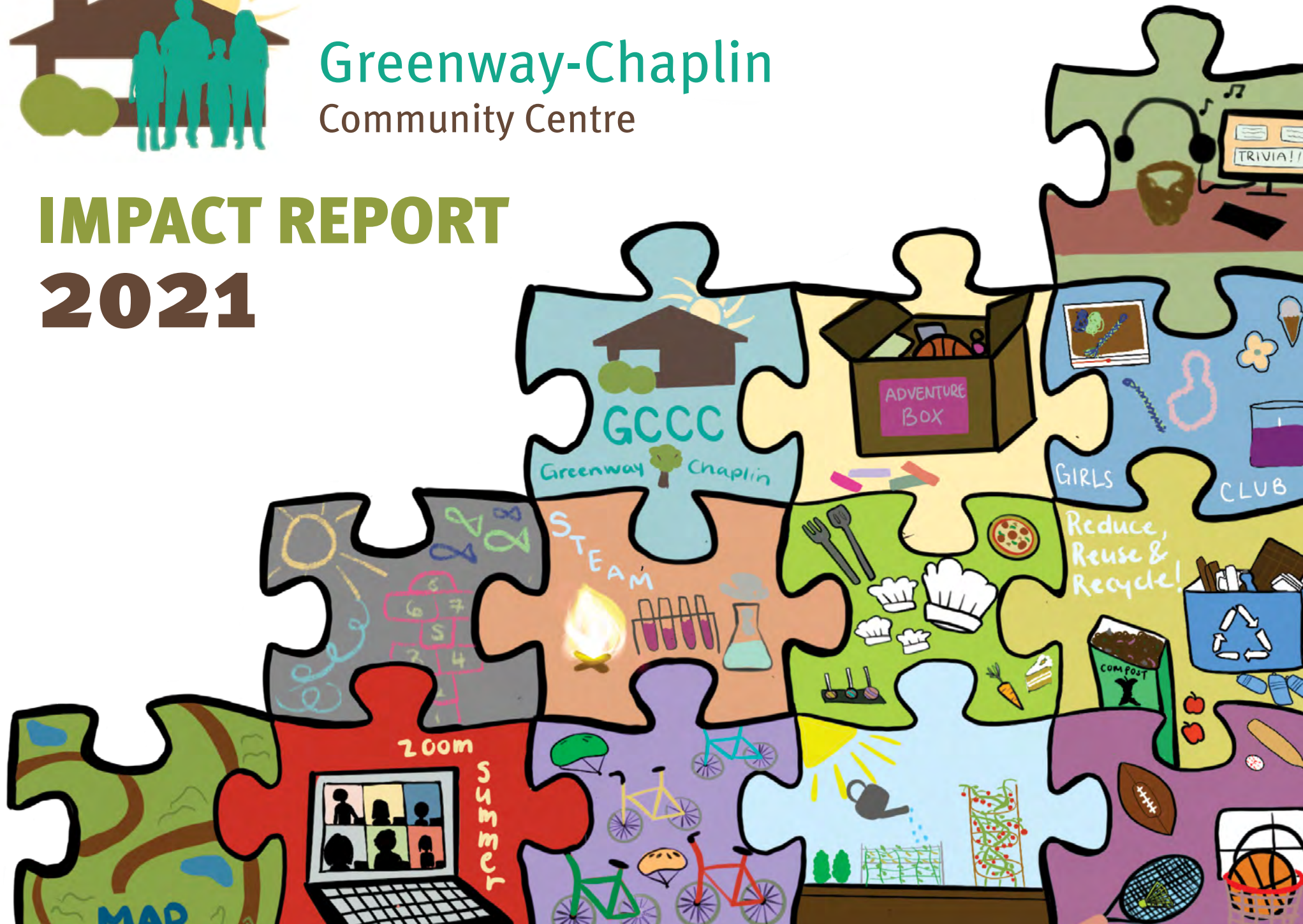

CONNECTING COMMUNITY

In 2021, we found creative ways to engage our neighbourhood and provide volunteer opportunities that gave back to our community. Throughout the last year, we have prioritized our volunteers – making sure to have space for them to grow in volunteer roles, within in-person COVID capacity limits and in virtual, or at home environments.

Whether it has been adapting existing volunteer roles to fit within pandemic guidelines (Virtual programming, Summer LIT's), or creating new opportunities such as Street Ambassadors, we have looked for ways to meet our community with their needs, interests and the skills and strengths they have to offer.

Through the dedicated efforts of our resident leads and staff coaches, we were able to successfully execute several NAG's (Neighbourhood Action Grants). These have allowed us to form new connections with our neighbours and strengthen those connections already in place, all while allowing leads and volunteers to develop a range of new leadership skills.

In September, we were grateful to see the return of placement students from Conestoga College. These students from the Social Service Worker program were with us for two days each week, and assisted with everything from program development and facilitation, to social media planning, volunteer management and events. We are looking forward to welcoming a new batch of students from the Recreation and Leisure program in the fall of 2022!

We are hoping to bridge the gap between the Muslim community and the wider public.

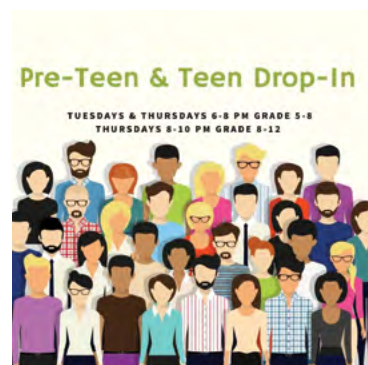
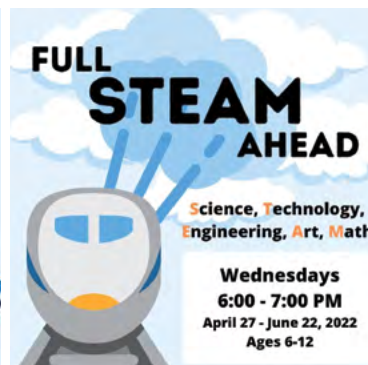

OUR MIX OF VIRTUAL AND IN-PERSON PROGRAMS

Greenway-Chaplin Community Centre continued to deliver exceptional programming to our community in 2021. The Greenway team pivoted to provide virtual programs and events from January through to June. In May 2021, the team began preparing for summer camp which was able to run in-person with campers cohorted into two weeks blocks.

As COVID-19 restrictions began to ease and protocols changed, Greenway was once again able to offer in-person, outdoor programs and events from September to December, including “A Very Haunted Centre” in October.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH

In 2021, GCCC received a Trillium Seed Grant to formalize the Youth Development Program. A Youth Development Staff was hired to support this 1 year project. The project began with a survey to better understand the training needs of youth who were looking to be employed. The survey informed the training opportunities provided to the GCCC youth in the fall of 2021 which includes First Aid, Safe Food Handling and Mental Health First Aid training. As COVID protocols continued to shift, training was provided online. 11 youths participated in the training. Winter 2022 online training was provided again and the project wrapped up in March 2022 with a final in person interview with the GCCC youth to hear about their experiences.

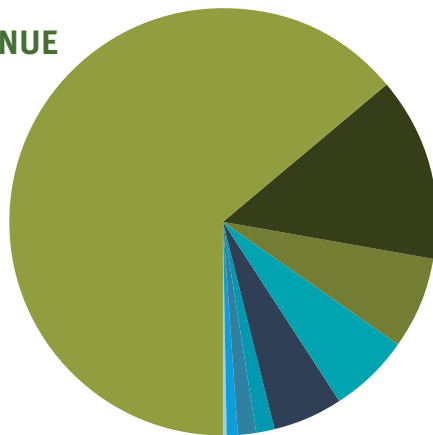

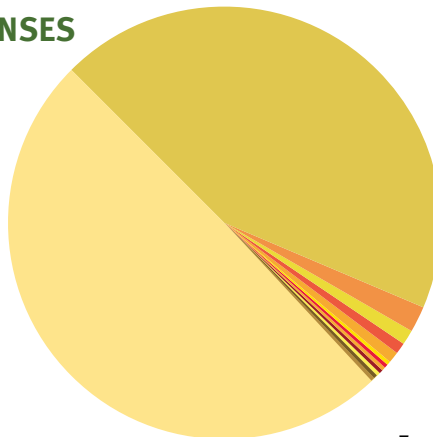

GREENWAY CAN GROW!

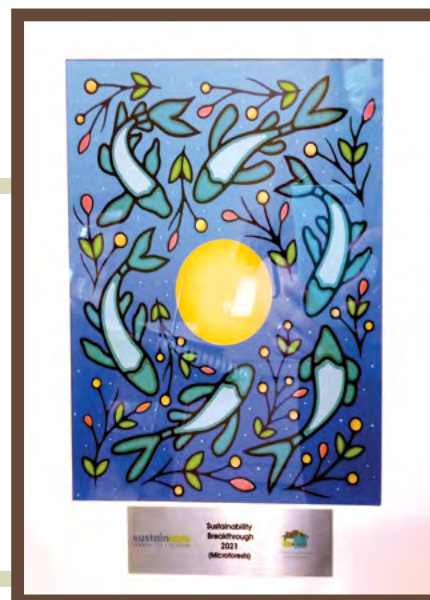
In 2021, GCCC staff built raised garden beds. Summer camp watered and harvested the amazing crops. Campers and neighbours loved to see what we were growing!

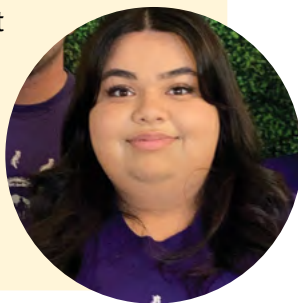
